WHY US?

- We work with more than 500 human service and social change organizations to provide internships and training opportunities for our students.
- Our curriculum prepares students for the LSW (licensure) exam and we have one of the highest exam pass rates.
- We have an International Partnership with Erfurt University (Germany) as well as educational trips to Cuba and other locations.
- Our students have access to one of the largest alumni groups in the area.

DEGREE PROGRAMS

Bachelor of Social Work (BSW)

The primary goal of this undergraduate program is to prepare students for social work that ensures human rights, including social, economic and cultural rights, for all. It is a 120 hour credit program that includes a year-long internship in a human service or social change organization during the senior year.

Master of Social Work (MSW)

This graduate program consists of 60 semester hours of course work and field practice taken full time (over two academic years), part time or online (over three to four academic years). An accelerated format is available for qualified students who have earned the BSW degree.

Dual Masters in Social Work and Public Health (MSW/MPH)

The College of Public Health offers a dual degree program that affords students the opportunity to earn the MSW (through the School of Social Work) and the MPH in three to five years. The primary goal of this dual degree program is to prepare professionals to assess, understand, prevent, and intervene in health and mental health related concerns that impact the well-being of individuals, communities, and populations through a social and economic justice lens.
